Triduum The Three Holy Days

Holy Thursday marks the end of Lenten preparation and the beginning of the three holy days of Christendom called the "Triduum." *Triduum* is Latin for "three days," referring to Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday. The Triduum services are closely connected and considered a single service that extends over the course of this three-day period. On these days, we focus on Christ's suffering, death, and resurrection – the chief events of Christ's life and the foundation of our saving faith.

Holy Saturday

The climax of the *Triduum* comes in the Vigil of Easter, a service of watching and waiting, using prayer, Scripture, and hymns. The Vigil is composed of four parts: (I) Service of Light, with its focus on the paschal candle, the representation of the unconquered life of Christ; (II) Service of Readings, with its use of Old Testament texts that foreshadowed our deliverance and rescue by Jesus; (III) Service of Holy Baptism, with its emphasis on our baptismal connection to Christ; and (IV) Service of Holy Communion, with its proclamation of the risen Savior and our blessed reconciliation to God.

The Vigil begins in darkness with the lighting of the paschal candle and the procession into the dark church. Light grows progressively during the service until the church is fully illuminated at the joyous shout of "Christ is risen!" The Service of Holy Communion is celebrated at the altar, which is now fully vested and decorated for Easter, bringing to a close the *Triduum's* cycle of services.

Vigil of Easter

Welcome to God's house in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ!

Please gather in the downstairs fellowship hall prior to the service and take a bulletin and a candle.

The beginning of the service will be conducted from there.

If you are not able to manage the stairs, please gather in the narthex or sit in a pew of your choosing.

Bulletins and candles will be available in the narthex as well. Those who gathered downstairs will gather in the narthex shortly after the service begins to process into the nave with you.

Please note that the first part of the service will be conducted by candlelight and the lessons will be read in darkness. Those with poor eyesight are invited to sit towards the back of the church where there is still some light from the narthex. The church will gradually grow lighter as the service progresses.

As you await instructions from the pastor, please take some time to review the bulletin in preparation for this unique service. You may find it a blessing to meditate on the hymn printed below which focuses on Christ's Sabbath rest in the tomb and our anticipation of his Easter triumph over death and the grave.

Greeting and Prayer

On this most holy night, in which our Lord Jesus Christ passed over from death to life, we are gathered here in vigil and prayer. This is the commemoration of our Lord's resurrection in which, by hearing his Word and celebrating his sacraments, we share in his victory over death.

Let us pray.

O God, you are like a refiner's fire, and your Spirit kindles the hearts of your faithful people with the fire of your love. Bless us as we celebrate this Easter festival that, burning with desire for life with you, we may be found rightly prepared to share in the feast of light which has no end, through Jesus Christ, your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

Blessing of the Paschal Candle

The candle bearer, holding the Paschal Candle, steps forward

The pastor traces the Greek letters A and Ω (Alpha and Omega) upon the Paschal Candle, and says:

Christ Jesus, the same yesterday, today, and forever, the beginning and the end, the Alpha and the Omega.

The pastor traces the year upon the Paschal Candle, and says:

His are time and eternity; his are the glory and dominion now and forever.

The pastor puts the five wax nails representing the wounds of Christ into the Paschal Candle, and says:

By his wounds we are healed now and forever.

The pastor lights the Paschal Candle from the Christ candle, and says:

May the light of Christ, who is risen in glory from the dead, scatter all the darkness of our hearts and minds.

Lighting of the Candles

The pastor will light the candles of those seated along the aisles.

Please light your candle from the person next to you. Please tip only the unlit candles.

Please keep your candles lit until you are directed to extinguish them later in the service.

Prayer

Let us pray.

Almighty and most merciful Father, once we were darkness, but now we are light in Jesus Christ our Lord. Abundantly bless all who joyfully celebrate this night in faith in the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. Fill us with your heavenly blessing in him, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

Amen.

Let us go forth in the name of the Lord.






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

Exsultet Easter Proclamation

The candle bearer places the Paschal Candle in its stand in the center of the chancel, and the cantor sings:

Rejoice now, all you heavenly choirs of angels; rejoice now, all creation; sound forth, trumpet of salvation, and proclaim the triumph of our King.

Rejoice too, all the earth, in the radiance of the light now poured upon you and made brilliant by the brightness of the everlasting King; know that the ancient darkness has been forever banished.

Rejoice, O Church of Christ, clothed in the brightness of this light; let all this house of God ring out with rejoicing, with the praises of all God's faithful people.



It is truly good and right that we should at all times and in all places, with all our hearts and minds and voices, praise you, O Lord, Holy Father, almighty and everlasting God, and your one and only Son, Jesus Christ. For he is the true Paschal Lamb, who offered himself for the sin of the world, who has cleansed us by the shedding of his precious blood.

This is the night when you brought our ancestors, the children of Israel, out of bondage in Egypt and led them through the Red Sea on dry ground. This is the night when all who believe in Christ are delivered from bondage to sin and are restored to life and immortality. This is the night when Christ, the Life, arose from the dead. The seal of the tomb is broken and the morning of the new creation breaks forth out of night. Oh, how wonderful and boundless is your mercy toward us, O God, that to redeem a slave you gave your Son.

How holy is this night when all wickedness is put to flight and sin is washed away. How holy is this night when innocence is restored to the fallen and joy is given to the downcast. How blessed is this night when mankind is reconciled to God in Christ.

Holy Father, accept now the evening sacrifices of our thanksgiving and praise. Let Christ, the true Light and Morning Star, shine in our hearts, he who gives light to all creation, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

Service of Holy Baptism

On this most holy night, the whole Church of our Lord Jesus Christ recalls his death and burial, rejoicing in the gospel of his glorious resurrection from the dead. Holy Baptism is the priceless means of grace by which our Father in heaven connects us with Christ in his life, death, and resurrection. The apostle Paul wrote: "All of us who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death. We were therefore buried with him through baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life." Again Paul wrote: "All of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ."

Remembrance of Our Baptisms

In Holy Baptism, God takes away our sins and gives us new life. We reject the devil and confess that we believe in God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit.

I ask you:

Do you reject the devil along with all his lies and empty promises? **Yes, and I ask God to help me.**

Do you believe in God, the Father Almighty? Yes, I believe in God, the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth.

Do you believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son?

Yes, I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried.

He descended into hell.

The third day he rose again from the dead.

He ascended into heaven

and is seated at the right hand of God the Father Almighty.

From there he will come to judge the living and the dead.

Do you believe in the Holy Spirit?

Yes, I believe in the Holy Spirit,
the holy Christian Church,
the communion of saints,
the forgiveness of sins,
the resurrection of the body,
and the life everlasting. Amen.

Is it your sincere prayer and desire to remain faithful to your Lord Jesus, to value the Word and sacraments, and to live a life that pleases God?

Yes, and I ask God to help me.

May the eternal God, who saved us through the washing of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit, bless you and keep you to everlasting life.

Loving Father, lead us to rejoice every day as we remember our baptism. When we sin against you and others, give us power to put down the sinful nature that was drowned in the water of baptism. When we doubt your love, cause us to remember the promises you made when we came to the font. When we feel weak, invigorate us with the hope of eternal life that awaits all who are baptized and believe in you.

Keep in your care all our brothers and sisters who are suffering in sickness, enduring hardship, carrying a cross, or mourning the death of someone they love. Let them also return to their baptism and remember the blessings you bestowed on them through the water and the Word. Keep all the baptized in your care and bring us at last to the river of the water of life in heaven. In Jesus' name, we pray.

Our Holy Communion Practices

(Matthew 10:32-33; Romans 16:17; 1 Corinthians 10:16-17; 11:27-29; Ephesians 4:4-6; 1 John 1:3; 2 John 9-11)

Visitors

Before approaching the altar to receive Holy Communion, please read the following notes:

The Holy Bible teaches the celebration of the Lord's Supper is an expression of unity in faith and teaching. To be "in communion" means to share and hold in common. By receiving Holy Communion, we are not only sharing Christ's true body and blood, but we are also confessing that we publicly hold in common the same teachings of God's Holy Word.

We therefore invite to Holy Communion only those Christians who share the same teachings to which we hold, all the while recognizing the true spiritual unity and fellowship of all believers in God's Holy Christian Church (i.e. the Communion of Saints). Confirmed members of Nain and confirmed visiting members of sister congregations in the WELS (Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod) and the ELS (Evangelical Lutheran Synod) are welcome to commune with us.

If you are a member of another Lutheran synod, another Christian denomination, or of another belief, we ask that you refrain from communing with us at this time. We do this out of love and in accordance with God's words through St. Paul in 1 Corinthians 11:27-29. The pastor would be happy to speak with you if you have interest in communing in the future or have any other questions or concerns about our practices. Thank you for your patience and understanding, and for respecting our beliefs.

Communicants

"Christian Questions," a guide for personal preparation before receiving Holy Communion is printed on pages 295-296 in the hymnal. Prayers for before and after communing are printed on the first page of the hymnal.

The usher will direct you to the front of the nave, where you will commune. When the pastor distributes the bread and body of Christ, he will say, "The body of Christ, given for you." When he distributes the wine and blood of Christ, he will say, "The blood of Christ, poured out for you." Before consuming the sacramental elements, you may respond to the pastor's words by saying, "Amen" (which is Hebrew for, "Truly," or "Yes, it is so") as a way to confess your belief that the body and blood of Jesus are truly present in the Lord's Supper for the forgiveness of your sins.

Children and Non-Communicants

Children and other non-communicants are welcome to approach the altar to receive a blessing from the pastor. He will make the sign of the cross on the head of each and say, "The Lord bless you." Non-Communicant adults are asked to cross their arms over their chest to indicate that they do not intend to commune.

As he distributes the elements, the pastor says to the communicants:

The body of Christ, given for you.

Amen.

The blood of Christ, poured out for you.

Amen.

As he dismisses the communicants, the pastor says:

The true body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ strengthen and preserve you to life everlasting. Go + in peace.






