Midweek Advent **Bible Songs of Christmas**

The Bible tells us that around the time Jesus was born, there were believers who burst forth in song to praise God for keeping his promise to send the Savior into the world. We have only the words of these songs, but Christian composers through the ages have set these words to music. During these services, we will look at the background and words of those songs and sing versions of them ourselves to help us prepare for our own celebration of Christ's birth.

The Song of Simeon

When the Bible was translated into Latin, "Nunc Dimittis" were the first words of the song that the elderly believer Simeon sang when he held the infant Jesus in his arms. He said, "Lord, now (nunc) you dismiss (dimittis) your servant in peace, according to your word" (Luke 2:29).

Simeon saw that the Child who had come to the temple was in fact The Temple, God's true and everlasting dwelling place with his people (John 1:14; 2:18-22). And so Simeon sang and rejoiced that God had sent salvation to his faithful ones and had made it known to them.

God has revealed himself to us through his gospel as well! Through this revelation, he gives us himself and all that he is and has. The Holy Spirit has given us the eyes faith to "see" the salvation of our God (Isaiah 40:5; Luke 3:6). Therefore, like Simeon, we too rejoice and sing his praises. Furthermore, we too can confidently depart this world in peace, knowing that our sins are forgiven and our home in heaven is secure all because of the Christ.

The "Song of Simeon" is a beautiful expression of praise to God for sending the Savior into the world and for keeping his promise to bring peace, forgiveness, and salvation to all who believe.







Service of the Word

Reading Isaiah 9:2-7

The prophet Isaiah foretells the coming of the Savior. A Light will dawn. He will scatter the darkness, defeat God's enemies, establish an everlasting Kingdom, and bring peace to his people. He will be everything the LORD has promised. This prophecy is fulfilled in Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace.

- The people walking in darkness have seen a great light.
 For those living in the land of the shadow of death, the light has dawned.
- You have multiplied the nation. You have increased its joy. They rejoice before you like the joy at harvest time, like the celebration when people divide the plunder.
- For you have shattered the yoke that burdened them. You have broken the bar on their shoulders and

the rod of their oppressor,

as you did in the day of Midian.

- 5 Every boot that marched in battle and the garments rolled in blood will be burned. They will be fuel for the fire.
- ⁶ For to us a child is born.

To us a son is given.

The authority to rule will rest on his shoulders.

He will be named:

Wonderful Counselor,

Mighty God,

Everlasting Father,

Prince of Peace.

There will be no limit to his authority and no end to the peace he brings.

He will rule on David's throne and over his kingdom,

to establish it and to uphold it with justice and righteousness

from now on, into eternity.

The zeal of the LORD of Armies will accomplish this.

Reading Luke 2:22-40

Forty days after Jesus was born, Mary and Joseph went to the temple in Jerusalem to complete the rite of purification after childbirth for Mary (cf. Leviticus 12:2-8), present and dedicate Jesus as the firstborn "holy to the Lord" (cf. Exodus 13:1-13), and offer the prescribed sacrifices. While at the temple, the family encountered two believers who were waiting for the fulfillment of God's promise to send the Messiah. God allowed elderly Simeon and Anna to see their Savior with their own eyes. This filled them with peace.

²² When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, they brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord. ²³ (As it is written in the law of the Lord, "Every firstborn male will be called holy to the Lord.") ²⁴ And they came to offer a sacrifice according to what was said in the law of the Lord, "A pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons."

²⁵ Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon. This man was righteous and devout, waiting for the comfort of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was on him. ²⁶ It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Christ. ²⁷ Moved by the Spirit he went into the temple courts. When the parents brought in the child Jesus to do for him what was customary according to the law, ²⁸ Simeon took him into his arms and praised God. He said,

- ²⁹ Lord, you now dismiss your servant in peace, according to your word,
- ³⁰ because my eyes have seen your salvation,
- ³¹ which you have prepared before the face of all people,
- ³² a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and the glory of your people Israel.

³³ Joseph and the child's mother were amazed at the things that were spoken about him. ³⁴ Then Simeon blessed them and said to Mary his mother, "Listen carefully, this child is appointed for the falling and rising of many in Israel and for a sign that is spoken against, ³⁵ so that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed. And a sword will pierce your own soul too."

³⁶ Anna, a prophetess, was there. She was a daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was very old. She had lived with her husband for seven years after her marriage, ³⁷ and then she was a widow of eighty-four years. She did not leave the temple complex, since she was worshipping with fasting and prayers night and day. ³⁸ Standing nearby at that very hour, she gave thanks to the Lord. She kept speaking about the child to all who were waiting for the redemption of Jerusalem.


³⁹ When they had accomplished everything according to the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town, Nazareth. ⁴⁰ The child grew and became strong. He was filled with wisdom, and God's favor was on him.



The Advent Wreath

The Advent wreath is believed to have originated in Germany, as a folk custom. The evergreen branches symbolize God's unending love for us, and eternal life found in Christ. The four candles set in the wreath represent the four Sundays in the season of Advent. The lighting of the candles each week in Advent marks the growing anticipation for the birth of Jesus Christ, who is the Light of the World.

The color of the candles is significant. Some churches use three purple or violet candles on the first, second, and fourth Sundays to remind us that Advent is a season of repentance. Other churches use three blue candles on these Sundays to symbolize our hope and expectation at the coming of Jesus, especially his second coming in glory on the Last Day. A rose or pink candle is often used on the third Sunday, historically observed as Gaudete (Rejoice!) Sunday as a reminder that Advent is also a time of joy. The fifth candle, if used, is white. It is lighted on Christmas Day and symbolizes the perfection and purity of God's gift to sinners: his righteous Son, Jesus Christ.

Some traditions associate a theme with each candle. One tradition is as follows...

The **Prophecy Candle** – Also called the Hope Candle, this purple/violet or blue candle symbolizes the Old Testament prophecies of Christ's coming.

The **Bethlehem Candle** – Also called the Peace Candle, this purple/violet or blue candle symbolizes the birth of Jesus to the Virgin May in the town of Bethlehem.

The **Shepherds' Candle** – Also called the Joy Candle, this pink or rose-colored candle symbolizes the coming of the Savior into the hearts and lives of believers, like he did with the shepherds at his birth.

The **Angels' Candle** – Also called the Good News Candle, this purple/violet or blue candle symbolizes the final glorious coming of the Savior with all his angels on the Last Day.

The **Christ Candle** – This white candle symbolizes the day of Jesus' birth, the coming we've been waiting for, the advent of Jesus, the Light of the World.
