Reading from the Small Catechism

A section of Martin Luther's Small Catechism may be read with the goal of each family member being able to memorize a sensible portion.

Holy Baptism: The Power of Baptism

Preschool + Third: How can water do such great things?

It is certainly not the water that does such things, but God's Word which is in and with the water and faith which

trusts this Word used with the water.

First Grade + For without God's Word the water is just plain water and not Baptism. But with this Word it is Baptism, that is,

a gracious water of life and a washing of rebirth by the Holy Spirit.

Second Grade + Where is this written?

St. Paul says in Titus, chapter 3, "[God] saved us through the washing of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit, whom he poured out on us generously through Jesus Christ our Savior, so that, having been justified by his grace,

we might become heirs having the hope of eternal life. This is a trustworthy saying."

Prayer

In addition to the previous Sunday's Prayer of the Day, the following themes may be incorporated into your daily prayer routine.

Sunday: Pray for the joy of the resurrection; for the fruit of faith nourished by the gospel; and for God to continue to shine the

light of his gospel into this world of darkness.

Monday: Pray for your calling and daily work; for workers and the unemployed, your neighbors, schools, teachers, students, and

civil authorities - that all may give glory to God.

Tuesday: Pray for deliverance against temptation and evil; for the addicted, despairing, suffering and oppressed – that all may

know deliverance from sin through Christ.

Wednesday: Pray for marriage; for families and individuals, communities and neighborhoods – that all may live in harmony and

believers may rejoice in being children of God.

Thursday: Pray for the Christian Church; for pastors, teachers, missionaries, and all who serve Christ; for the spread of the gospel

and the proper use of the sacraments.

Friday: Pray for the sick, the injured, and the dying – that all may know the eternal life that comes through Jesus' death and

resurrection.

Saturday: Pray for faithfulness to the end; for the renewal of faith in those who are withering or who have fallen away; for

believers as they prepare to receive God's grace.

The Lord's Prayer

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever and ever. Amen.
