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The Season of Advent

When the Lord Comes Near

"Advent" is a Latin word that means "coming." The season of Advent is the four-week period before Christmas that the Church uses to connect the two "comings" of Christ. The first time the Lord came into our world it was as a tiny, helpless baby, born in a manger in Bethlehem. However, when Jesus comes again, it will be in all his power and glory with his angelic army behind him. He will be coming as judge at the end of time. Let us use these four weeks to see how the events of Jesus' first coming remove all our fears about his second coming. We can hold our heads high when the Lord comes near.

Midweek Advent Series **Lo, He Comes with Clouds Descending**

This Advent series is based on readings from the apostle St. Paul's first letter to the Thessalonians, focusing us on the hope we have as we await the second coming of Jesus.

The Thessalonians were not only worried about their own departure; they were also concerned about loved ones who had died in the Lord. St. Paul assures them, and us, that Christians who die are in fact only asleep. When the Lord Jesus *comes with clouds descending*, their bodies shall awake to join their souls so they will live body and soul with the Lord forever in heaven! We are confident of this because Jesus has died and rose again as promised, and we are hidden in him; united to him by faith. Therefore, as we look forward to Jesus' return, let us encourage each other with these words!


SERVICE OF LIGHT



Our worship begins with the tolling of the bells, followed by the opening hymn.




PRAYER FOR PEACE



The Advent Wreath

The Advent wreath is believed to have originated in Germany, as a folk custom. The evergreen branches symbolize God's unending love for us, and eternal life found in Christ. The four candles set in the wreath represent the four Sundays in the season of Advent. The lighting of the candles each week in Advent marks the growing anticipation for the birth of Jesus Christ, the Light of the World.

Various traditions explain the color for the candles.

Some churches use three purple or violet candles on the first, second, and fourth Sundays to remind us that Advent is a season of repentance. Other churches use three blue candles on these Sundays to symbolize our hope and expectation at the coming of Jesus; especially his second coming in glory on the Last Day.

A rose or pink candle is often used on the third Sunday, historically observed as Gaudete (Rejoice!) Sunday as a reminder that Advent is also a time of joy.

The fifth candle, if used, is white. It is lighted on Christmas Day and symbolizes the perfection and purity of God's gift to sinners: his righteous Son, Jesus Christ.

Some traditions associate a theme with each candle. One tradition is as follows...

The **Prophecy Candle:** Also called the Hope Candle, this violet or blue candle symbolizes the Old Testament prophecies of Christ's coming.

The **Bethlehem Candle:** Also called the Peace Candle, this violet or blue candle symbolizes the birth of Jesus to the Virgin May in the town of Bethlehem.

The **Shepherds' Candle:** Also called the Joy Candle, this pink or rose-colored candle symbolizes the coming of the Savior into the hearts and lives of believers, like the shepherds at Jesus' birth.

The **Angels**' Candle: Also called the Good News Candle, this violet or blue candle symbolizes the final glorious coming of the Savior with all his angels on the Last Day.

The Christ Candle: This white candle symbolizes the day of Jesus' birth, the coming we've been waiting for, the advent of Jesus, the Light of the World.
