Holy Week A Holy Week

While there are many holy days, there is but one Holy Week. The final week of Lent marks the most pivotal week in human history. Believers slow down this entire week to ponder all that Christ did for them, from his humble entrance into Jerusalem... to his sacrificial death on the cross... to the victory of Easter morning.

Triduum **The Three Holy Days**

Maundy Thursday marks the end of Lenten preparation and the beginning of the three holy days of Christendom, called the *Triduum* (Latin for "three days," referring to Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday). The Triduum services are closely connected and considered a single service that extends over this three-day period.

Holy Saturday Vigil of Easter

The climax of the *Triduum* comes in the Vigil of Easter, a service of watching and waiting, using prayer, Scripture, and hymns. The Vigil is composed of four parts: (I) Service of Light, with its focus on the paschal candle, the representation of the unconquered life of Christ; (II) Service of Lessons, with its use of Old Testament texts that foreshadowed our deliverance and rescue by Jesus; (III) Service of Baptism, with its emphasis on our baptismal connection to Christ; and (IV) Service of Holy Communion, with its proclamation of the risen Savior and our blessed reconciliation to God.

+ THE VIGIL OF EASTER +

CELEBRATION OF OUR LORD'S RESURRECTION AND OF OUR BAPTISM

Welcome to God's house in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ!

Please gather in the downstairs fellowship hall prior to the service and take a bulletin and a candle. The beginning of the service will be conducted from there. If you are not able to manage the stairs, please gather in the narthex or sit in a pew near the back of the church. Bulletins and candles will be available in the narthex. Those who gathered downstairs will arrive to the narthex shortly to process into the nave with you.

Please note that the first part of the service will be conducted under candlelight, and the lessons will be read in darkness. Those with poor eyesight are encouraged to sit towards the back of the church where there is still some light from the narthex. The church will gradually grow lighter during the service.

As you prepare for worship and await instructions from the pastor, please remain silent and take some time to read through the bulletin carefully in preparation for this unique service.

THE SERVICE OF LIGHT

(Exodus 13:21,22; John 1:3-9; 8:12; 1 John 1:5-7)

TOLLING OF THE BELLS

INVOCATION (Matthew 28:19; 2 Corinthians 13:14)

M: In the name of the Father and of the Son † and of the Holy Spirit.

C: Amen.

M: On this most holy night, in which our Lord Jesus Christ passed over from death to life, we are gathered here in vigil and prayer. This is the Passover of the Lord in which, by hearing his Word and celebrating his sacraments, we share in his victory over death.

PRAYER

M: Let us pray.

O God, you are like a refiner's fire, and your Spirit kindles the hearts of your faithful people with the fire of your love. Bless, we ask you, this new flame and those who keep this joyful Easter festival. Burning with desire for life with you, may we be found rightly prepared to share in the Feast of Light which has no end,

through Jesus Christ, your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

C: Amen.

THE BLESSING OF THE PASCHAL CANDLE

- * The candle bearer, holding the paschal candle, steps forward. The pastor traces the cross and the Greek letters A and Ω (Alpha and Omega) upon it, saying:
 - M: Christ Jesus, the same yesterday, today, and forever, the beginning and the end, the Alpha and the Omega.
- * The pastor traces the year upon the candle, saying:
 - M: His are time and eternity; his are the glory and dominion now and forever.
- * The pastor puts the five wax nails representing the wounds of Christ into the candle, saying:
 - M: By his wounds we are healed now and forever. Amen.
- * Then, lighting the candle from the Christ candle, the pastor says:
 - M: May the light of Christ, who is risen in glory from the dead, scatter all the darkness of our hearts and minds.

LIGHTING OF THE CANDLES

* The pastor will light the candles of those seated along the aisles. Please light your candle from the person next to you (tip only the unlit candles). Keep your candles lit until directed to extinguish them later.

PRAYER

- * Please stand.
- M: Let us pray.

Almighty and most merciful Father, once we were darkness, but now we are light in Jesus Christ our Lord. Bless abundantly all who joyfully celebrate this night in faith in the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. Fill them with your heavenly blessing in him, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, now and forever.



* Following the pastor and candle bearer, please process up the stairs and gather in the narthex.


PROCESSION

* As the procession begins, the candle bearer pauses at the entrance to the nave and sings:




- * Follow the candle bearer and the pastor into the nave and enter a pew of your choosing.

EXSULTET - EASTER PROCLAMATION


* The candle bearer places the paschal candle in its stand in the center of the chancel, and the cantor sings:

Cantor: Rejoice now, all you heav'nly choirs of angels; rejoice now, all creation; sound forth, trumpet of salvation, and proclaim the triumph of our King.

Rejoice too, all the earth, in the radiance of the light now poured upon you and made brilliant by the brightness of the everlasting King; know that the ancient darkness has been forever banished.

Rejoice, O Church of Christ, clothed in the brightness of this light; let all this house of God ring out with rejoicing, with the praises of all God's faithful people.



Oh, how wonderful and beyond all telling is your mercy toward us, O God, that to redeem a slave you gave your Son.


How holy is this night when all wickedness is put to flight and sin is washed away.



THE SERVICE OF HOLY BAPTISM


(Matthew 3:13-17; Romans 6:3,4; Colossians 2:11,12; 1 Peter 3:21; Titus 3:4-7)

M: On this holiest of days, the whole Church of our Lord Jesus Christ recalls his death and burial, rejoicing in the gospel of his glorious resurrection from the dead. Holy Baptism is the precious means of grace by which our Father in heaven connects us with Christ in his life, death, and resurrection.

The apostle Paul says: "Don't you know that all of us who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were therefore buried with him through baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life. If we have been united with him in his death, we will certainly also be united with him in his resurrection. For we know that our old self was crucified with him so that the body of sin might be done away with, that we should no longer be slaves to sin—because anyone who has died has been freed from sin. Now if we died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. For we know that since Christ was raised from the dead, he cannot die again; death no longer has mastery over him. The death he died, he died to sin once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God. In the same way, count yourselves dead to sin but alive to God in Christ Jesus."

REMEBRANCE OF OUR BAPTISMS

M: In Holy Baptism, God takes away our sins and gives new life in Christ our Lord. We solemnly renounce the devil and all his works and all his ways; we confess the gift of faith in God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. I ask you: Do you reject the devil along with all his lies and empty promises?

C: Yes, and I ask God to help me.

M: Do you believe in God, the Father almighty?

C: Yes, I believe in God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth.

M: Do you believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son?

C: Yes, I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried.

He descended into hell.

The third day he rose again from the dead.

He ascended into heaven

and is seated at the right hand of God the Father almighty. From there he will come to judge the living and the dead.

M: Do you believe in the Holy Spirit?

C: Yes, I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy Christian Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

- M: Do you intend to continue in this faith, to be diligent in the use of Word and sacrament, and in faith and action remain true to God Father, Son, and Holy Spirit as long as you live?
- C: Yes, and I ask God to help me.
- M: Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has given you the new birth of water and of the Spirit and has forgiven you all your sins, strengthen you with his grace to life everlasting.
- C: Amen.

THE SERVICE OF HOLY COMMUNION

(Matthew 26; Mark 14; Luke 22; 1 Corinthians 11)

- * The altar candles are lit from the paschal candle. Please remain silent for meditation.

 Once the altar candles are lit, the lights of the church are fully lit, and the pastor exclaims:
- M: Alleluia! Christ is risen!
- C: He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

ALLELUIA REFRAIN (Psalm 150; Revelation 19)

* The cantor will introduce the Alleluia refrain. Then the congregation will join in singing the refrain the second time and responsively thereafter.

Cantor: Alleluia! Alleluia! Alleluia!



Cantor: For as in Adam all die, so in Christ all will be made alive. (1 Corinthians 15:22)

This is the day the Lord has made; Let us rejoice and be glad in it. (Psalm 118:24)



* The pastor processes to the center of the nave for the proclamation of the Easter Gospel.

HOLY GOSPEL Matthew 28:1-10

* Please stand.

M: The Holy Gospel of Our Lord, according to St. Matthew, chapter twenty-eight.

28 After the Sabbath, at dawn on the first day of the week, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to look at the tomb.

²There was a violent earthquake, for an angel of the Lord came down from heaven and, going to the tomb, rolled back the stone and sat on it. ³ His appearance was like lightning, and his clothes were white as snow. ⁴The guards were so afraid of him that they shook and became like dead men.

⁵The angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. ⁶He is not here; he has risen, just as he said. Come and see the place where he lay. ⁷Then go quickly and tell his disciples: 'He has risen from the dead and is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see him.' Now I have told you."

⁸So the women hurried away from the tomb, afraid yet filled with joy, and ran to tell his disciples. ⁹Suddenly Jesus met them. "Greetings," he said. They came to him, clasped his feet and worshiped him. ¹⁰Then Jesus said to them, "Do not be afraid. Go and tell my brothers to go to Galilee; there they will see me."





DISTRIBUTION OF HOLY COMMUNION (1 Corinthians 11:26)

* Visitors

Before approaching the altar to receive Holy Communion, please read the following notes:

The Holy Bible teaches the celebration of the Lord's Supper is an expression of unity in faith and teaching (to be 'in communion' means to share and hold in common). By eating and drinking at our Lord's Table, we are not only sharing Christ's true Body and Blood, but we are also confessing that we publicly hold in common the same teachings of God's Holy Word.

We therefore invite to Holy Communion only those Christians who share the same teachings to which we hold, all the while recognizing the true spiritual unity and fellowship of all true Christians in God's Holy Christian Church (i.e. the Communion of Saints). Confirmed members of Nain and confirmed visiting

members of sister congregations in the WELS (Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod) and the ELS (Evangelical Lutheran Synod) are welcome to commune.

If you are a member of another Lutheran synod, another Christian denomination, or of another belief, we ask that you refrain from communing with us at this time. We do this out of love and in accordance with God's words through St. Paul in 1 Corinthians 11. The Pastor would be happy to speak with you if you have interest in communing in the future or have any other questions or concerns about our practices. Thank you for your patience and understanding, and for respecting our beliefs.

* Communicants

A guide for personal preparation before receiving Holy Communion is found on page 156 in the front of the hymnal. Prayers for before and after Holy Communion are found on page 11.

When the pastor distributes the bread and body of Christ, he will say, "The body of Christ, given for you." When the pastor distributes the wine and blood of Christ, he will say, "The blood of Christ, shed for you." Before consuming the sacramental elements, you may respond to the pastor's words by saying, "Amen" (which is Hebrew for, "Truly," or "Yes, it is so") as a way to confess your belief that the body and blood of Jesus are truly present in the Lord's Supper for the forgiveness of your sins.


* Children and Non-Communicants

The Paschal Candle

Paschal, meaning "having to do with the Passover," is a word associated with Easter, for it was at the conclusion of the Jewish Passover Festival (the "Pasch") that Jesus rose from the dead and proved himself to be the true Passover Lamb whose blood removes the threat of death (Exodus 12 & 1 Corinthians 6:6-8).

Paschal Candles are usually very large, white, and inscribed with a cross and the Greek letters Alpha (A) and Omega (Ω) - the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet – which symbolize that Christ is eternal, the beginning and end (Revelation 1:8; 22:13).

The Paschal Candle is lit every Easter morning to symbolize that Christ is alive and lives among his people. It is then lit for every service during the season of Easter as we continue to celebrate Christ's resurrection. The candle is also lit at Holy Baptisms and Christian funerals, reminding us of the believer's new birth and resurrection to eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord.
