Our Greatest Needs

Mankind's greatest problems are universal. We all live under the curse of sin. That sin makes us utterly helpless in our natural state. Natural man is confused, unable to make sense of life. Left in sin, man is doomed to death, and not just physical death. After one's heart stops comes another type of death that is infinitely worse, an eternal nightmare.

Lent is the season of the Church Year when we wrestle with our greatest needs. Lent also shows us that in Christ, all our greatest needs are met. Here is what the Spirit makes clear this season. If you lack Christ, you have nothing. If you have Christ, you have everything you truly need.

Midweek Lent

Trial before the High Priest

This evening we continue to hear from the Passion History of our Lord according to the Gospel of St. Matthew. After being captured in Gethsemane, Jesus was led to the house of the high priest. The conflict between Jesus and the enemies of light escalated as Jesus was tried, mocked, and rejected. In the hour of Jesus' trial, Peter was also tried by God to give a confession of faith. In fear, he failed. Jesus' word and look brought Peter to tears of sorrow.

We too are tested by God to trust in him and boldly confess our faith in him as Lord and Savior. Since we, like Peter, also fail in this regard, we also must sorrow over our sins. Our Lord Jesus ever looks at us in love and calls us to repentance. And he restores us by his grace, given through his Word and Sacraments, lifting us up from the pit of despair with his ever-forgiving love.

There will be no pre-service music or announcements.


Our worship begins with the tolling of the bells, followed by the opening hymn.





Passion History

Matthew 26:57-75

⁵⁷ Those who had arrested Jesus led him away to Caiaphas, the high priest, where the experts in the law and the elders were assembled. ⁵⁸ Peter was following him at a distance and went as far as the courtyard of the high priest. He went inside and sat down with the guards to see how it would turn out.

⁵⁹ The chief priests and the whole Sanhedrin were looking for false testimony against Jesus so that they could put him to death. ⁶⁰ They found none, even though many false witnesses came forward. Finally two came forward ⁶¹ and said, "This fellow said, 'I am able to destroy the temple of God and rebuild it in three days."

⁶² The high priest stood up and said to him, "Have you no answer? What is this that these men are testifying against you?" ⁶³ But Jesus remained silent. Then the high priest said to him, "I place you under oath by the living God: Tell us if you are the Christ, the Son of God!"

⁶⁴ Jesus said to him, "It is as you have said. But I tell you, soon you will see the Son of Man sitting at the right hand of power and coming on the clouds of heaven."

⁶⁵ Then the high priest tore his robes and said, "He has spoken blasphemy! Why do we need any more witnesses? See, you have just heard the blasphemy! ⁶⁶ What do you think?"

They answered, "He is deserving of death!" ⁶⁷ Then they spit in his face and punched him. Some slapped him ⁶⁸ and said, "Prophesy to us, Christ! Who hit you?"

⁶⁹ Meanwhile Peter was sitting outside in the courtyard. A servant girl came to him and said, "You were also with Jesus the Galilean."

⁷⁰ But he denied it in front of everyone, saying, "I don't know what you're talking about."

⁷¹ When Peter went out to the entryway, someone else saw him and said to those who were there, "This fellow was with Jesus of Nazareth."

⁷² Again Peter denied it with an oath and said, "I do not know the man."

⁷³ After a little while those who stood by came and said to Peter, "Surely you are also one of them because even your accent gives you away."

⁷⁴ Then he began to curse and to swear, "I do not know the man!" Just then the rooster crowed. ⁷⁵ And Peter remembered the word Jesus had spoken, "Before the rooster crows, you will deny me three times." And he went outside and wept bitterly.


