Our Greatest Needs

Mankind's greatest problems are universal. We all live under the curse of sin. That sin makes us utterly helpless in our natural state. Natural man is confused, unable to make sense of life. Left in sin, man is doomed to death, and not just physical death. After one's heart stops comes another type of death that is infinitely worse, an eternal nightmare.

Lent is the season of the Church Year when we wrestle with our greatest needs. Lent also shows us that in Christ, all our greatest needs are met. Here is what the Spirit makes clear this season. If you lack Christ, you have nothing. If you have Christ, you have everything you truly need.

Midweek Lent **Trial before Pilate**

This evening we continue to hear from the Passion History of our Lord according to the Gospel of St. Matthew. After Jesus identified himself as the Son of God to the elders, chief priests, and teachers of the law, he was sent to Pontius Pilate, the Roman governor of Judea. The Jewish mob accused Jesus of blasphemy, but Pilate was only concerned with their political charges. Pilate and Herod wound up finding no basis for a charge against Jesus, but still did not believe in him.

Jesus makes great claims to us – to be our Servant, our Shepherd, our Savior, etc. Do we believe these claims, or fight against and reject him like his enemies did? Jesus bore our sins, including those of doubt, rejection, and unbelief – just as he bore the false accusations levied against him during his trial – and nailed them to the cross. It is only through faith in him as our Savior from sin that we are saved.

There will be no pre-service music or announcements. Our worship begins with the tolling of the bells, followed by the opening hymn.







Passion History

27 Early in the morning, all the chief priests and the elders of the people reached the decision to put Jesus to death. ² They bound him, led him away, and handed him over to Pontius Pilate, the governor.

³ Then when Judas, who had betrayed him, saw that Jesus was condemned, he felt remorse. He brought back the thirty pieces of silver to the chief priests and elders ⁴ and said, "I have sinned by betraying innocent blood." But they said, "What is that to us? That's your problem."

⁵ He threw the pieces of silver into the temple and left. Then he went out and hanged himself. ⁶ The chief priests took the pieces of silver and said, "It is not lawful to put these into the treasury, since it is blood money." ⁷ They reached a decision to buy the potter's field with the money, as a burial place for foreigners. ⁸ So that field has been called The Field of Blood to this day. ⁹ Then what was spoken through Jeremiah the prophet was fulfilled:

They took the thirty pieces of silver, the price the sons of Israel had set for him, ¹⁰ and they gave them for the potter's field, just as the Lord commanded me.

¹¹ When Jesus stood in the presence of the governor, the governor asked him, "Are you the King of the Jews?"

Jesus said to him, "It is as you say."

¹² When he was accused by the chief priests and elders, he answered nothing. ¹³ Then Pilate said to him, "Don't you hear how many things they are testifying against you?"

¹⁴ But he did not answer him—not even one word, so that the governor was very surprised.

¹⁵ At the time of the Festival the governor had a custom to release to the crowd any one prisoner they wanted. ¹⁶ At that time they were holding a notorious prisoner named Barabbas. ¹⁷ So when they were assembled, Pilate said to them, "Which one do you want me to release to you? Barabbas—or Jesus, who is called Christ?" ¹⁸ For Pilate knew that they had handed Jesus over to him because of envy.

¹⁹ While he was sitting on the judgment seat, Pilate's wife sent him a message. "Have nothing to do with that righteous man," she said, "since I have suffered many things today in a dream because of him." ²⁰ But the chief priests and the elders persuaded the crowd to ask

for Barabbas and to have Jesus put to death. ²¹ The governor asked them, "Which of the two do you want me to release to you?"

"Barabbas!" they said.

²² Pilate said to them, "Then what should I do with Jesus, who is called Christ?"

They all said to him, "Crucify him!"

²³ But the governor said, "Why? What has he done wrong?"

But they kept shouting even louder: "Crucify him!"

²⁴ When Pilate saw that he was accomplishing nothing and that instead it was turning into a riot, he took water, washed his hands in front of the crowd, and said, "I am innocent of this righteous man's blood. It is your responsibility."

²⁵ And all the people answered, "Let his blood be on us and on our children!"

²⁶ Then he released Barabbas to them, but he had Jesus flogged and handed him over to be crucified.






